Shelter houses and Lodge are used every weekend by scouts, families and other groups. Natural Resource Center Educational Staff teaching school groups at Russell Woods and making classroom visits. PDRMA Risk Management and Loss Control review and preserve safety in progress for 2016 compliance.



Recently the Sycamore Lions presented a check to cover the cost of the new Sycamore Lions Shelter which was recently installed at the Sycamore Forest Preserve. The check was given to Terry Hannan, Superintendent DeKalb County Forest Preserve and Anita Turner DeKalb County Board, Forest Preserve Committee. The presentation was made at the new Lions Shelter in Sycamore Forest Preserve, formerly the Evergreen Village mobile home park property on the east side of Sycamore. The renovations of the property are in progress with opening planned for Spring 2017. The Lions are grateful to be able to provide this shelter for the residents of Sycamore, and guests of the DeKalb County Forest Preserve.

The Sycamore Lions have a long history with the DeKalb County Forest Preserve having adopted the Great Western Trail more than 25 years ago. Each spring the Lions clean the trail and the north side of Route 64. In 1998, the club's Fiftieth Anniversary, the Lions installed two handicap picnic tables on the trail, and in 2012 the lions funded and planted oak trees along the trail as part of the Lions Clubs Million Tree challenge. This year the Lions are celebrating the 100th anniversary of Lions Clubs International by providing service to one million people worldwide through centennial projects and service activities.

Sycamore Forest Preserve update:

The first "leveling layer" of asphalt was placed on roads, parking areas and multi - use paths at Sycamore Forest Preserve in late Fall 2016 (see photos below). Sycamore Forest Preserve is "almost" completed. The final 3 " of asphalt will be placed in Spring of 2017, along with the final grading and landscaping, parking space painting, signage, gates, benches and other land improvement details.

The land also needs to be transferred from County ownership to Forest Preserve ownership by FEMA (FEMA has told us it is a priority). The 60 acre Sycamore Forest Preserve land needs to be in Forest Preserve District ownership as required by PDRMA https://www.pdrma.org/, the Forest Preserve District risk manager for liability and property insurance. The trail connection strip of land from Sycamore Forest Preserve east to the Great Western Trail through Stone Prairie Apartments land also needs to be transferred to the Forest Preserve District (will have land transfer paperwork soon from Stone Prairie)so a few more things to do.
