Law & Justice Committee Minutes November 17, 2014

The Law and Justice Committee of the DeKalb County Board met on Monday, November 17, 2014 at 6:30 p.m. in the Administration Building's Conference Room East.

Chairman Frieders called the meeting to order. Those present were Mr. Cvek, Ms. Leifheit, Mr. Oncken, Mrs. Tobias and Mrs. Turner. Ms. Polanco was absent. Six members were present and one absent.

Others present were Roger Scott, Gary Dumdie, Tom McCulloch, Margi Gilmour, and Tracy Jones.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Moved by Mr. Oncken, seconded by Mr. Cvek and it was carried unanimously to approve the minutes from November 5, 2014.

APPROVAL OF THE AGENDA

It was moved by Mrs. Turner, seconded by Mr. Oncken and it was carried unanimously by voice vote to approve the agenda.

PUBLIC DEFENDER'S REPORT - MR. THOMAS McCULLOCH

Public Defender, Tom McCulloch and the Committee reviewed the monthly Public Defenders report and Mr. McCulloch reiterated that last month he had shared that due to an absence in his office, the reporting numbers may have been a little less accurate but this month they were back to normal. Looking at the report, he shared that his office was still slightly ahead and in general for the season that was normal.

COURT SERVICES REPORTS - MS. MARGI GILMOUR

Ms. Gilmour was very happy to announce that she got word that afternoon from the Administrative Office of Illinois Courts that DeKalb County was approved for 100% of the funded Ms. Gilmour applied for which was for \$282,000 annually in addition to the current funding from AOIC. She shared that the State is pro-rating the amount based of the State's Fiscal Year and Ms. Gilmour will have to send in monthly vouchers to receive the checks from the State. The amount that is being allocated is based on the 7 months left in the State's Fiscal Year (\$164,935). She also mentioned that Mr. Hanson was made aware of the great news this afternoon and he prepared a short statement for the Committee:

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"I will ask the Board to amend the FY 2015 Budget Resolution to allow for the receipt of the increased State funding (about \$282,000) and to authorize the hiring of two new positions in the Court Services Department at an estimated cost of \$154,000 (with benefits). I would suggest no other action to be taken by the Board on how to allocate the other \$128,000 until at least January when a thorough review can be made on other budget requests that had been previously denied. No action is needed tonight at the Law & Justice Committee."

Ms. Gilmour also reviewed her monthly reports with the Committee. She shared that they had one juvenile removed from residential placement and into an independent living facility which no longer is a cost to the County. It was stated that the County is over on their Placement Budget and also over in the Detention Budget for the current Fiscal Year.

JAIL REPORT

Sheriff Roger Scott shared that the average daily jail population for the month of October was 136 and the average number housed out-of-county was 42.

He also shared that the on Saturday, December 13th at 11:00 a.m. will be the DeKalb County Sheriff's Public Auction at the Mike Mooney Chevrolet parking lot located at 204 N. 4th St., DeKalb, IL. The auction will have vehicles from the County's Sheriff's Office, City of Sycamore Water Division, and the City of Rochelle. A copy of the flyer is attached to these minutes.

SHERIFF'S PROPANE PILOT PROGRAM UPDATE

Sheriff Scott introduced Chief Deputy Gary Dumdie to the Committee to give them an update on the Sheriff's Department Propane Pilot Program.

Chief Deputy Dumdie reiterated to the Committee how the Sheriff's Department came to the idea of starting the Propane Pilot Program and how he visited a Sheriff's Department in Jefferson County Wisconsin in February of 2013 to see how they have been utilizing propane in their vehicles for over 30 years now.

Chief Dumdie shared that six new Chevrolet Tahoe's were going to be converted to a dual fuel propane system and put in service during the department's 2014 squad replacement cycle. The squads are able to burn either propane or regular gas. In addition to the much lower cost, propane is a cleaner burning fuel for both the engine and environment. Greenhouse gas emissions are reduced by up to 25% compared to gasoline and propane does not leave heavy carbon deposits inside the engines which can potentially add longevity and reduce maintenance costs to the vehicles. The Deputies assigned propane vehicles received safety training and certification on propane autogas refueling from HicksGas in Cortland who is supplying the propane and fueling equipment.

The Illinois EPA offers rebates of up to 80% to a maximum of \$4000.00 for alternative fuel conversions such as propane and CNG (Compressed Natural Gas) which was used to help lower the conversion costs for the squads. The US Department of Energy also offers a rebate program for propane autogas which is .50 cents per gallon and will be applied for when it is available.

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Chief Dumdie continued that during the initial stages of the program fuel savings costs will be monitored to see if it will be cost effective to continue conversion of the patrol fleet to propane in the coming years. Long range monitoring will determine whether or not the systems help save on maintenance and fuel costs for overall lifecycle savings on the squads. In 2000 the department switched to Chevrolet Impala's as a means to reduce fuel consumption and costs which has been very successful and the hope is that this will be the next step in further reducing those costs.

He also expressed that their long term goal is to get not only the entire fleet switched over to propane conversions, but also that other municipalities and possible the Highway Department would like to make the conversions as well so they would obtained their own co-op fueling station.

Mr. Cvek asked if there has been any recent discussions with other municipalities to gage if they are interested in instituting these conversions as well. Chief Dumdie answered that most are sitting back and observing at this time to see the full outcome of the Sheriff's vehicles at this time.

The Committee thanked the Sheriff and Chief Dumdie for all their work on this project and were all excited to see the results of the costs savings the Propane Pilot Programs is said to incur.

SOBER LIVING HOME REVIEW

Chairman Frieders noted that he asked for this item to be placed on the agenda as an opportunity for the Committee to express any questions or concerns they may have regarding the Sober Living Home Program.

Ms. Leifheit asked how many persons were thought to live in the Sober Living Home. Mrs. Tobias expressed she had the understanding there would be about 6-8 persons in the house, one being a house supervisor. Mr. Oncken added that the only expenses would be a stipend for the house supervisor and utilities/maintenances because they would potentially already have a residence with no mortgage or taxes if the County purchased the home for the program.

Mr. Cvek asked if there was a particular reason that no one from Drug Court was present at the meeting this evening. Chairman Frieders shared that he did not ask anyone to come because it would have been too short of notice.

Chairman Frieders asked the Committee if they would like to invite a representative from Drug Court to address the members on costs and other items pertaining to the Sober Living Home at another date in the near future. The Committee agreed that if a representative could come to even the Executive Committee Meeting on December 10th that would be helpful and any additional questions could be answered at that time. It was also reminded that there is going to be a Public Forum Meeting for all of the Community regarding the Sober Living Home on December 4th at 6:30 p.m.
